
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Welcome

The Table is a community art project about connection, belonging, and radical hospitality. It's not about putting on a perfect dinner party — it's about opening your table a little wider. We're inviting you to host your own Table Gathering: a simple meal, 12+ people, one shared act of creativity, and a few meaningful conversations.

Your gathering will become part of The Table installation at the Final Feast (20 December 6:30pm - 8:30pm) and be featured across our blog, social media, and Coffee Table Book to be released next year.



Your Role as Host



Hosting is EASY

You're simply creating a space for people to come gather. All you need is:

- A table (or picnic rug!) kitchen, living room, backyard, park, or community hall.
- 12 or more people mix of friends, neighbours, colleagues, wider community and maybe a few you don't yet know.
- Simple food finger food, soup, bread, or whatever feels right and EASY.
- Paper cups and conversation.

Radical Hospitality

Radical hospitality is an open table — not fancy, not fussy, just real.

It's saying: "Come as you are — there's room for you here."

It's about making space for stories, laughter, silence, difference, and connection.

The magic happens not in what's served, but in who's seen.





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How to Host: Step by Step



Choose Your Date & Place

Any time that works for you between now and 15 December. Anywhere that feels welcoming: home, park, community hall, backyard, picnic table.





Invite Your Guests

Text, call or write a simple message We have attached some draft messages you can copy







Keep it light — no stress! Share food everyone can nibble while chatting. Of course, if you love to cook up a feast, by all means, go for it! Smile.





Gather and Begin

Start by explaining The Table: "We're part of a community art project exploring radical hospitality.

The idea is simple — we share food, conversation, and each decorate a paper cup." ... the rest is YOURS!



Paper Cups

Each person decorates one plain paper cup (white or cream). These cups will become part of the large hanging installation at the Final Feast.



What You'll Need:

Plain cups (available at grocery stores, dollar shops, or The Reject Shop). Sharpies, textas, crayons, or paints. Anything goes.

Decorating Ideas:

Patterns, words, symbols, doodles — whatever feels right and enjoyable to you!



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The Conversation

Invite guests to chat while they decorate. Use these prompts as a guide:

Start Light - Easy Entry

- What's your favourite comfort food or drink and why that one?
- Tell us about a table you used to love sitting at (or one you love now).
- What's something small that's been bringing you joy lately?
- If you had a free afternoon to yourself, where would we probably find you?

Go a Little Deeper - Connection & Belonging

- Who in your life makes you feel most yourself?
- Can you think of a time someone really showed up for you? What did they do?
- What do you think people sometimes misunderstand about you or what do you wish they knew?

Deeper Still – Meaning & Hope

- When do you feel most connected to the world around you?
- What kind of life or community do you hope to help create in small, everyday ways?
- What's one thing you'd like to thank the world (or someone in it) for, right now?

Optional

When do you feel most connected to the You can include one "wildcard" prompt for fun, such as: "If your table could talk, what story would it tell about you?"

Encourage real, gentle conversation. No right answers.









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Capturing the Stories


Each group should record a few reflections — this is how they'll be shared in the artwork and online.

Ways to capture:

- Write short notes or quotes on paper.
- Record voice memos on your phone.
- Take 10-30 sec videos (1 question per clip).
- Or upload longer videos to YouTube and send us the link.

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Quick Supply Checklist

Hosting a Table Gathering is easy — here's everything you need to make it happen:

Food & Hospitality

- Simple shared food bread, soup, snacks, finger food
- Plates, cups, and napkins (whatever you have at home is fine)
- A jug of water, tea, or something to share
- Optional: a little treat or favourite comfort food

Space & Setup

- A table, picnic rug, or shared surface
- Enough seats (or floor cushions!) for 12+ people
- A relaxed, welcoming atmosphere candles, fairy lights, or just your usual kitchen glow

Creative Supplies

- Plain paper cups (white or cream preferred from your local supermarket, dollar store, or Reject Shop)
- Decorating tools: sharpies, textas, crayons, paints, or collage materials
- Drop cloth or newspaper (optional, to protect surfaces)

Conversation & Reflection

- The Shared Tables Question Sheet (print or read aloud)
- Paper or notebook for jotting down quotes or reflections
- Phones for short audio or video recordings (keep clips under 30 seconds)



Capture & Share

Take a photo of your group, your table, or the finished cups

Email stories, notes, or photos to Kendall

(Subject line: "Shared Tables")

It doesn't need to be fancy — the heart of The Table is connection, not perfection.



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Sample Invite Text

Subject: Pull up a chair – you're invited to The Table
